ARCHITECT JAMES KISSLINGContinues to Turn Heads With Innovative Designs









James Kissling is a problem-solver. Homebuyers and other clients come to him wanting comfort, ease, simplicity, convenience, functionality and enough of that "wow" factor that makes their friends jealous. And Jim, using his creative skills as a designer and architect, usually rises to the challenge.



Kissling lives on a beautiful, working ranch in the Hill Country, a few peaceful minutes north of Loop 1604 out Blanco Road. And he also works there, in a separate office he built 18 years ago. The architectural

firm consists of Ashley Powell, Carrie Simacher, Juan Zaizar, Toni Trevino, Javier Sandoval, and Carlos Menendez. Since the office is somewhat remote, Kissling implemented a four-day workweek and allows for employees to work remotely if need be.

In addition to designing homes in the area, their other projects have included the San Antonio Foodbank complex, Retama Park Racetrack Backstretch, La Gloria at the Pearl, Navigation District Offices in Rockport along with over 30 projects in Cinnamon Shores on Mustang Island which includes the 2015 *Coastal Living Magazine* show house.

James has more than 30 years of experience in the architectural and construction industries. He draws upon a vast knowledge base of using various elements and building systems to help meet the clients' goals of cost, design aesthetic, energy efficiency, sustainability and function.

"I was born and raised here in San Antonio, attending St. Gerard's Catholic School and then graduating from Thomas Edison High School. This is where I discovered drafting in my junior year, and it really struck a chord within me.

"I started in the architectural Industry in September of 1980 as a draftsman for John Speegle, Architect in San Antonio, TX. This was the time before computers, and everything was hand-drafted."

Kissling went on to work for William Hablinski Architecture who specialized in high-end residential and commercial projects, building models and working as a draftsman. Upon graduation from the fledgling UTSA Architecture School in 1988, he worked with local firms which included Louis Jargeui Architect/builder, Joe Stubblefield and Richard Mogas (Stubblefield /Mogas) and Overland Partners.

In 1993 James received both his architectural and interior designer licenses. Then three years later joined HEB as a corporate architect designing new stores and prototypes. In March of 2000, he decide it was time to hang out his own shingle and established Kissling

Architecture in Bulverde Texas. The firms specializes in custom residential, ranch compounds, commercial infill projects, retail and hospitality architecture. Their current projects include a mixed-use project on Main Street in Downtown Boerne, Old Fitzhugh Road mixed-use project in the historic district of Dripping Springs, TX, renovation of Del Rio High School, a townhome project in Cinnamon Shores, Mustang Island and numerous high-end residences in the Hill Country and along the Texas coast line.

His architectural designs are shaped by the natural attributes of the site and the man-made additions that impact its use. Each design is uniquely tailored to each site and never a one-size-fits-all approach. Each piece of architecture, according to James, should be timeless with the final product a true collaboration between the client and the architect. He believes that architecture is not meant to be a monument to the architect.

"We recently participated in the 2018 AIA home tour that showcased a project by Kissling Design Build, which was one of two projects completed last year by my brother John and I. I've worked with a variety of builders over the years, and when I get to work with John it's special. I know I'll always get top-shelf results when we're working together."

James has been married to Kimberly (Clark)Kissling for 23 years and live a on the same working ranch as the office – a true Texas Live/Work environment. Their children, Gretchen and Cameron are the next generation of the Architecture/Agricultural legacy at the ranch. ■
